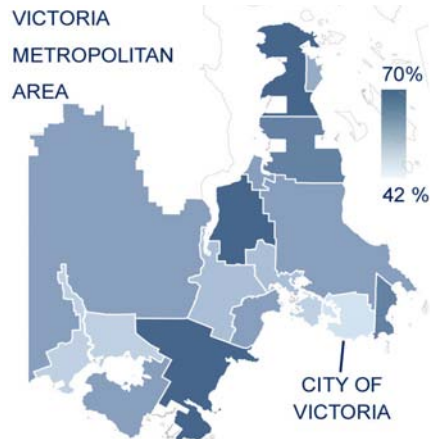
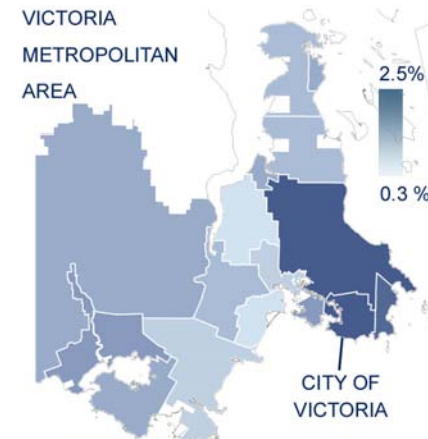
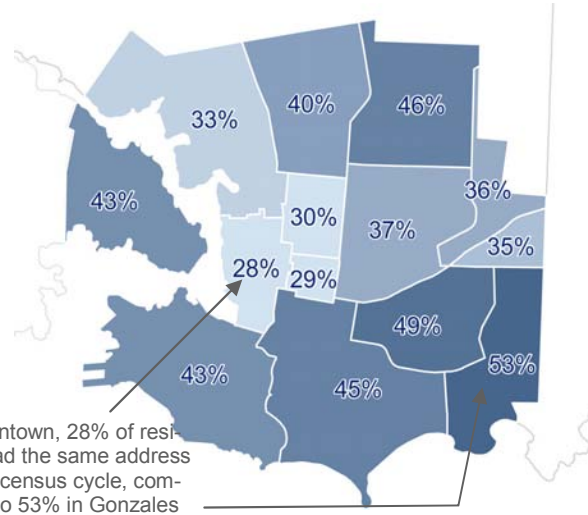

The City of Victoria has experienced similar trends to the rest of the region with respect to the settlement of recent immigrants (those who arrived in Canada within the 2001-2006 reporting period). The 2006 census indicated that the largest place of origin of recent immigrants was Asia and the Middle East, followed by Europe.

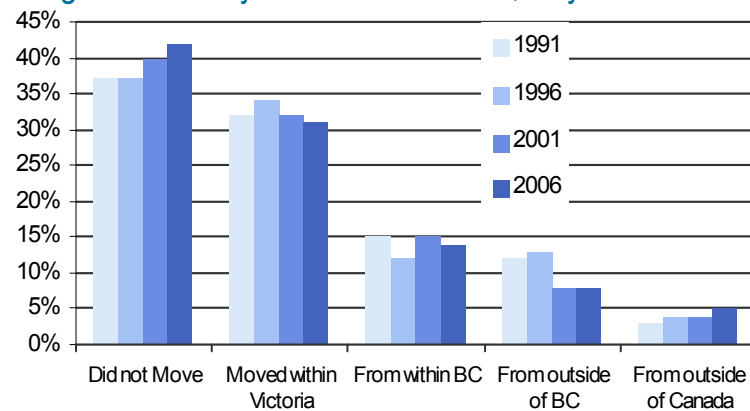
Since 1991 more people are staying in place and more people are moving to Victoria from outside of Canada. The number of non-movers (residents with the same census address from the previous census) within the city of Victoria has increased from 38% to 42% from 1991 to 2006. Within the City, the Gonzales neighbourhood has the highest proportion of non-movers with 53%. This is in contrast to Downtown which had only 28% of non-movers in the last five years.

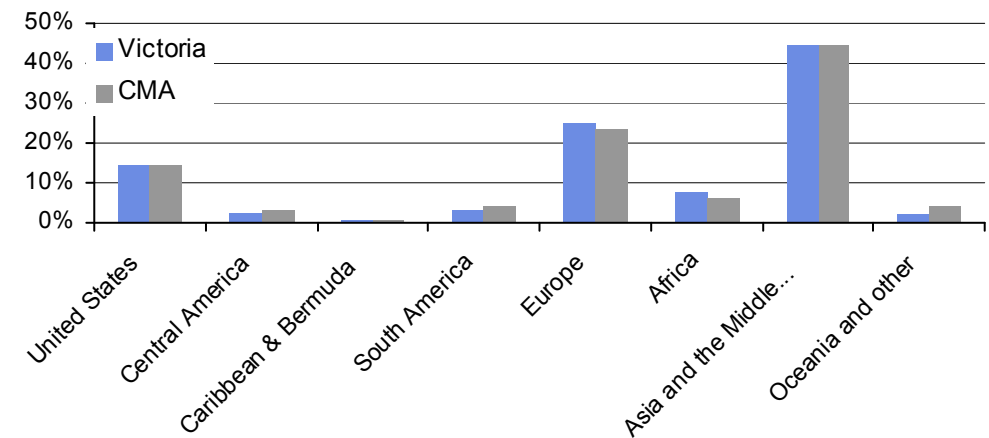
